



## Global Health Advocacy Incubator (GHA) Overdose Prevention Initiative

### FY 2026 Appropriations Crosswalk

The Appropriations Crosswalk helps advocates connect overdose prevention priorities to the specific federal funding lines where Congress makes decisions. It translates broad goals into the exact accounts, programs and bill language that determine what gets funded and what gets left behind. The Global Health Advocacy Incubator (GHA), Overdose Prevention Initiative built this crosswalk as a practical guide so partners can move from general funding requests to targeted, actionable asks that align with how appropriations staff work. Use it to find the right funding account for your priority, track changes across House and Senate bills, identify where report language can protect evidence-based programs, and make clearer requests to lawmakers that are easier to advance during negotiations.

**Summary – SAMHSA Funding Overview:** The [final Fiscal Year \(FY\) 2026 appropriations bill](#) for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services (HHS), Education and Related Agencies provides increased funding for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration’s (SAMHSA) total program level compared to final FY 2025 funding levels. These increases diverge from the significant proposed cuts to SAMHSA included in the President’s budget request (PBR) and House recommendations for FY 2026, as well as from the proposed reorganization of SAMHSA and other parts of HHS.



SAMHSA total program level changes from FY 2025 to FY 2026: (+\$65,311,000 total)

- Treatment total: +\$13,000,000
- Mental Health total: +\$14,900,000

**Summary – SAMHSA PRNS:** The [final FY 2026 appropriations bill](#) for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies includes various changes to SAMHSA’s Programs of Regional and National Significance (PRNS), a critical source of funding for mental health and substance use programs nationwide. Many of these programs were among the hundreds of grants, valued at an estimated \$2 billion, abruptly terminated overnight by the Administration on January 13, 2026, before being subsequently reinstated the following day.

While many SAMHSA PRNS are level-funded for FY 2026, the bill includes an overall \$12 million reduction across substance use treatment programs; \$16.02 million reduction across mental health programs; and \$2 million increase across substance use prevention programs compared to final FY 2025 enacted funding levels.

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
